INDORAMA COMPLETES **FERTILISER TRAIN 3**

**IN RECORD TIME -
100 DAYS AHEAD OF
SCHEDULE**



COVER STORY

Indorama Eleme Fertiliser and Chemicals Limited (IEFCL) has achieved a remarkable engineering milestone with the successful completion and commissioning of its third fertiliser production line (Train 3). The landmark project which takes the company's Fertiliser production capacity to a record 4.2 million metric tonnes per annum was delivered 100 days ahead of schedule.



Speaking on the achievement which comes with numerous socio-economic benefits to the Nigerian economy, Mr. Anand Gupta, New Project Manager at Indorama-Nigeria, attributed the early delivery to the exceptional coordination and synergy between the contractors, Indorama's in-house project team, and other vendors. "This success reflects the high level of excellence, dedication, and seamless collaboration that went into the project," he said.

The feat is even more impressive considering Train 3 was a greenfield project built on about 250 hectares of

land. Before construction could begin in October 2023, the team had to clear massive sand heaps using three specialised contractors, 20 excavators, and over 100 dump trucks. They also constructed 8 km of drainage systems and 6.5 km of internal roads.

With the addition of Train 3, Indorama's total fertiliser production capacity has now increased to over 4 million metric tonnes per annum (MTPA) of urea, making it one of the largest integrated fertiliser complexes in Africa by installed urea capacity. The new line adds 2,300 metric tons per day (MTPD) of ammonia and 4,000 MTPD of granular urea.

A high-powered delegation from Nigerian Midstream and Downstream Petroleum Regulatory Authority (NMDPRA), led by its then Chief Executive, Engineer Saidu Mohammed, visited the Indorama Petrochemicals and Fertiliser Complex on Wednesday, January 21, 2026, and expressed strong admiration for the project. "This development strengthens Nigeria's role as a key hub in the energy and gas value chain," Engineer Mohammed noted, insisting that "It will drive growth across multiple sectors through enhanced

value addition to our hydrocarbon resources."

While Train 3 replicates the proven technology of Trains 1 and 2, Indorama conducted detailed studies that led to significant improvements, including enhanced automation systems and advanced sensors for faster detection of ammonia and gas leaks. The project also features state-of-the-art process units, auxiliary systems for steam, cooling, water treatment, product handling facilities, and a dedicated jetty at Onne Port for efficient exports.

The successful commissioning of Train 3 marks a giant leap toward Indorama's vision of transforming Nigeria into a net exporter of fertilisers. By significantly boosting local production, the company is reducing dependence on fertiliser imports, saving foreign exchange, increasing export earnings, and ensuring stable and affordable fertiliser supply for Nigerian farmers.

This will directly benefit Nigeria's agricultural sector, which employs a large percentage of the population, through higher crop yields, improved food security, and better rural livelihoods.

However, beyond agriculture, the project drives broader economic diversification. It adds value to natural gas that might otherwise be flared, creates thousands of direct and indirect jobs, and stimulates ancillary industries in logistics, packaging, and services. As a major foreign direct investor, Indorama continues to demonstrate the power of public-private partnerships in harnessing Nigeria's resources for sustainable growth.



Addressing Food Insecurity in Nigeria: The Significance of Indorama's Fertiliser Train 3 Completion

Rising global population has placed food security at the heart of national survival strategies. The 2024 World Population Data Sheet projects the world's population to reach nearly 9.6 billion by 2050. For Nigeria, currently estimated at 232 million people, the population is expected to grow by 54% over the same period. With Nigeria as Africa's most populous nation, the urgency to scale up agricultural productivity has never been greater.

Successive Nigerian administrations have responded with policies to reposition agriculture for self-sufficiency. The privatisation programme under former President Olusegun Obasanjo proved pivotal. In 2006, Indorama entered Nigeria's industrial landscape by acquiring controlling shares in the then-decaying Eleme Petrochemicals Company Limited from NNPC. After a decade of high-quality polymer resin production, Indorama expanded into fertilisers, a move widely seen as critical to tackling food insecurity amid infrastructure gaps, insecurity, and climate challenges.

Fertilisers are the backbone of modern agriculture, supplying

nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium that boost crop yields and soil fertility. Nigeria's reliance on imported fertilisers historically drove up costs, eroded farmers' margins, and pressured the naira. Indorama's intervention directly addressed this vulnerability, aligning with government efforts to stimulate growth and reduce trade imbalances.

Indorama's multi-train urea complex is a game-changer. In 2016, the company commissioned its first fertiliser plant, a single-train urea facility with a production capacity of 1.4 million metric tonnes per annum, inaugurated by then Acting President Yemi Osinbajo. Line 2 followed in 2021, further expanding local supply. The

completion of Fertiliser Line 3 in June 2026 is a watershed moment for Nigeria's food security plan. It raises Indorama's combined urea capacity to 4.2 million metric tonnes per year, enabling Nigeria to meet domestic fertiliser demand and export surplus for foreign exchange. This milestone significantly reduces Nigeria's exposure to volatile global fertiliser markets and price shocks.

Indorama is now one of Nigeria's leading fertiliser provider, supplying granular urea to farmers in all states and the FCT at affordable rates. Through the Presidential Fertiliser Initiative, the company helps stabilise supply and prices. Its policy of prioritising

local demand before exports ensures that Nigerian farmers get first access, with surplus shipped through its Onne jetty to earn foreign exchange.

Beyond supply, Indorama strengthens food security through extension services. More than 60 agronomists provide free training on planting, fertiliser application, weed control, and nutrient

management. A world-class soil testing laboratory offers free, detailed analysis to guide efficient fertiliser use, helping farmers boost yields and income.

With Nigeria's population projected to hit 400 million by 2050, Train 3 positions the country to scale food production sustainably. Indorama's next targets are Train 4 & 5 by fourth quarter of 2029 and

fourth quarter of 2030 respectively, which will lift annual capacity to 7 million metric tonnes and expand agronomic support nationwide. By combining large-scale production with farmer education, Indorama's fertiliser intervention is not just adding supply, it is anchoring Nigeria's long-term food security strategy.

Rising Together: How Indorama's Success Powers Small Businesses Around the Complex

The steady expansion of Indorama's operations at its Eleme Petrochemicals and Fertiliser Hub is creating a ripple effect that is transforming the local economy beyond the company's gates. Just outside the main entrance of Indorama Complex, a vibrant ecosystem of small businesses is thriving.

Okada riders, POS agents, and food vendors, none of whom work inside the complex, have built sustainable livelihoods around the daily movement of workers, contractors, and visitors.

Every morning, Mr. Chinedu Odey parks his motorcycle at his usual spot near the gate. A few years ago, he would sit for hours waiting for passengers. Today, he barely catches a break. "Before Indorama scaled up, I would wait from 7am till 2pm and maybe carry just five passengers," he says.

"Now, with shift changes, I'm constantly moving workers and contractors to junctions, markets, and homes. My daily income has jumped from about N7,000 to something far more meaningful."

Chinedu has no company ID and has never entered the complex. He doesn't need to. His business runs on the steady flow of people

moving in and out.

A few meters away, Blessing Amadi operates her POS stand under a bright blue umbrella. Her customers are the same workers Chinedu transports — people who need quick cash and can't afford long bank queues. "Indorama is the reason I'm here," Blessing says with a smile. "Most workers don't carry much cash. On salary days, I handle over 500 transactions — withdrawals, transfers, airtime sales. We're outside the fence, but we've become part of their daily routine."

For Mama Peculiar, a popular food vendor, the impact is visible in her bigger cooking pots and improved service. The high demand from workers has pushed her to raise her standards. "Indorama workers don't have time to waste," she explains. "If your food isn't ready or your place isn't clean, they won't return. Now, even people from the community trust me more because of the standards I've set."

The vendors are realistic about their dependence on the company. "If activity around the complex reduced significantly, it would be very quiet here," Blessing admits with a laugh. "But we've also built a customer base from the nearby estates. We wouldn't collapse, but our income would drop sharply."

For Mama Peculiar, "rising together" has a simple, heartfelt meaning: "Indorama didn't push us aside. I used to sell 20 plates a day. Now I sell many more. My daughter's school fees are paid from this small spot outside the gate. That's what rising together means."

Outside the Indorama complex, success doesn't wear a uniform. Sometimes it rides an okada, sometimes it operates a POS machine, and sometimes it comes from a modest food table under the sun. But in all its forms, it is rising— together



Indorama Targets \$8 Billion Investment in Nigeria by 2030

... House Committee expresses confidence in Indorama



The management of Indorama's Nigeria operations has announced plans to invest \$8 billion in the country by 2030. The investment will include expanding its current three fertiliser plants to five and constructing an additional methanol plant. Mr. Ashok Sharma, Head of Quality Assurance and Quality Control, made the declaration on Thursday, June 4, 2026, during an oversight visit by the House of Representatives Committee on Petroleum Resources (Midstream) to Indorama Petrochemicals and Fertiliser Complex in Eleme, near Port Harcourt, Rivers State.

The committee was led by its Chairman, Hon. Prince Henry Odianose Okojie, and included nine other members: Hon. Koki Segir Ibrahim (Deputy Chairman), Hon. Obuzor Victor Chukwuemele, Hon. Cyril Godwin Hart, Hon. Ife Ehindero, Hon. Terseer Ugbor, Hon. David Zachariah, Hon. Yusuf Ahmed Doro, Hon. Maureen Gwasham Chinwe, and Hon. Rotimi Akintunde Oluwaseun.

They were accompanied by the committee's clerk, deputy clerk, and seven other aides.

In his presentation, Sharma highlighted that Indorama, which operates more than 100 manufacturing sites across 38 countries, intends to add two new fertiliser plants. The fourth plant is scheduled to begin construction in the fourth quarter of 2026 and be completed by the fourth quarter of 2029, while the fifth plant will start in the fourth quarter of 2027 and

finish by the fourth quarter of 2030.

He also noted that in 19 years of operation in Nigeria, Indorama has carried out five Turnaround Maintenance (TAM) exercises on its Olefins plants, significantly improving the performance of its polyethylene (PE) and polypropylene (PP) facilities.

The company has over the years, made substantial dividends and community-related payments to its host communities. Ms. Judith Oputa of the Community Relations Department outlined the company's Corporate Social Responsibility initiatives, which focus on education, infrastructure development, skill acquisition programmes, and grants to women entrepreneurs, among other areas.

After receiving a formal welcome from the Indorama team led by Sharma and listening to the presentations, the lawmakers offered their comments and

observations before embarking on a tour of the production facilities, power plants, and utilities. In response to a question from the committee, Barrister Clifford Osagie, Head of Legal, emphasised that Indorama remains fully committed to complying with both local and international regulations and standards.

The committee Chairman, Hon. Prince Henry Odianose Okojie, expressed strong satisfaction with the company's performance and contributions, describing the comments by members of the committee as an expression of confidence in Indorama.

"The committee is highly impressed by Indorama's operations and sincerity in giving back to society through its CSR projects," he said. However, while commending the efforts already made, he urged Indorama to do even more in supporting community development.

The South-South Regional Coordinator of the Nigerian Midstream and Downstream Petroleum Regulatory Authority, Engr. I.O.
